


DO YOU KNOW ABOUT THE MEMORIAL FUND BOOK?






AROUND THE WIS

<u>Malham WI</u>

They say that Women's Institute members are a resourceful and clever lot, and this was evident in bucket loads at our March meeting. As we welcomed our fellow Malham member Dr Jane Smart OBE to talk about her career as a botanist and wildlife plant conservationist, we thought we were prepared.

Prior to the meeting there were the usual WhatsApp messages flying about as to who was bringing the dips/scones/trifle etc. However... we didn't factor in that the projector had been upgraded. As our WI 'tech



Jane's amazing career took her to the GLC advising 'Red Ken' on nature management in London, co-authoring with Chris Baines in the 1980s, 'A Guide to Habitat Creation' which is still recognised today as a good practice guide in the planning and construction of habitat management projects. Jane didn't stop there, she founded and became the first CEO of Plantlife, the wild plant conservation charity campaigning and raising awareness of the need for a focus on plant conservation. As a strategic organisation Plantlife became the blueprint for future conservation organisations, and with the patronage of King Charles, then Prince of Wales, its influence grew. And there's more. Jane then went on to work for IUCN, in Geneva. If you want to know what they do, look it up! It's incredible; in a nutshell it's an international organisation that is the global authority on the status of the natural world.

The breadth and depth of Jane's talk was phenomenal, I could go on! It's rare when those listening to a presentation are of the same opinion, that they want their speaker to continue for at least another hour. Following lots of questions from the audience Jane deserved her supper. Nobody wanted to go home! **Tracey Baron, Malham WI.**

Marton Cum Grafton WI

Rebecca Wilson is the fifth generation on the family's arable and sheep farm in North Yorkshire. She completed a BA in Human, Social and Political Sciences at the University of Cambridge and an MSc in Rural Estate Management at the Royal Agricultural University. Rebecca pursued roles as a rural surveyor and project manager before returning to the farm. She shares her daily life on Instagram, with a following of over 40k, and as co-host of the



Becca & Lizzie podcast she aims to bridge the gap between farmer and consumer. Rebecca's presentation to Marton-cum-Grafton WI focussed on the role of social media in promoting sustainable agriculture. Her definition of sustainability included more than just the environment, highlighting people, financial, animal welfare and heritage. Rebecca shared the relentless battle farmer's face to meet environmental goals whilst also being at

the mercy of a grossly unfair supply chain which means that, often, the costs of production are not covered. Farmers are 'price-takers' which means that they are unable to set their own prices to reflect their costs, unless they are able to sell produce direct for example through setting up a farm shop.

The presentation also touched on employment challenges faced by the sector, including uncompetitive wages and long working. The agricultural industry has more to do to foster personal development and encourage training, as time and finances do not allow for this.

Notwithstanding these difficulties, Rebecca also brought great enthusiasm around the opportunities which social media and online platforms can bring – a never seen before opportunity for farmers to quite literally be found in the hands of consumers - consumers who have perhaps never been to the countryside or visited a farm.

Rebecca shortly heads to the House of Lords (in partnership with the farming charity The Royal Agricultural Benevolent Institution), to address Parliamentarians, opinion formers and the trade and consumer press. The event is centred around the challenges which face the farming community and particular the impact of these challenges on mental health. In her talk to the WI, Rebecca noted that 58% of females in agriculture experience mild, moderate or severe anxiety and it is statistics like this which highlight the threat to the sustainability of the farming workforce of which Rebecca wants to raise awareness. **Joanne Long, Marton cum Grafton WI.**
