Why not have a go at the classes below?

Craft:	Max 3 entries	A picture made from natural materials mounted no larger than A4 including mount, i.e. think flow- ers, wool, seeds etc.
Recycling:	Max 3 entries	Repurpose a container to give it another useful life with a note stating "original and new purpose". Maximum size 15 cm x 15 cm x 30 cm high.
Knitting & Crocheting:	Max 3 entries	A knitted or crocheted animal: this need NOT be a toy for a child to play with but could also be e.g. a doorstop, could be something like a stuffed and mounted animal head.
Craft:	Max 3 entries	A fabric draught excluder to fit a standard door – embellish as you wish.
Floral:	Max 3 entries	A welcome planter – fresh plant material, internal diameter 25 cm (remember you have to carry it).
Floral:	Max 3 entries	An arrangement of fresh flowers in a jam jar to brighten your kitchen table.
Baking:	Max 3 entries	A crunchy top lemon cake see back of entry form for recipe.
	Max 3 entries	4 pieces of Tray Bake – please submit the recipe.
	Max 3 entries	3 different preserves on a board supplied by us – minimum jar size 8 oz.
Special Class: Not to be judged – maximum 3 entries	Indicate num- ber of entries and the type of craft and size of exhibit	"Something I made earlier". Can be any draft just to be displayed to showcase our WI members' talents.

Our Spring Council is also proving very popular as we go to print - we already have 205 members attending with a further 34 Institutes to reply, it's a good job Tennants can cope with all who wish to come as I have checked with Jessica the Events Manager there will be no problem. I can remember the very first time we went we had 435 attend, and that was in the year all Yorkshire Federations celebrated their centenary.

National's Annual Meeting 4th June - we still have some places if any visitors wish to come and join us at Alma House that's just £5.00 to cover morning coffee, light lunch from 10.00am - 4.00pm. From the correspondence we have received in the Office I think National are wanting us all to celebrate this great achievement of our movement, so if you do decide to do something special don't forget to let us know.

100 Years of Friendship Fun and Laughter Anne Townsend, Burton Leonard WI





On 10th February 2025, Burton Leonard WI (BLWI) celebrated its centenary. The event was marked on the day by a lunch in the village hall. Members enjoyed a two course meal, washed down with a glass of fizz. The table had been beautifully decorated by the committee, in a green, white and purple theme, echoing not only the colours of the WI movement, but also those who campaigned long and hard for women's suffrage. Members were gifted a booklet, charting the story of BLWI over the century, researched and written by Anne Townsend. The lunch was organised by Avril Clarke, the celebration cake was baked and iced by Marcia Crossley and floral table decorations were made by Mavis Hammond and Carol Banks. It was a fitting and memorable way to celebrate such a milestone.

However, the fun did not stop there. The following weekend, BLWI hosted an exhibition, organised by Anne Townsend, opened by Federation Chair Julie Clarke and attended by Tom Gordon MP. The exhibition expanded on the material in the book, with both focused on three key themes: membership, philanthropy, community and activities. A whole display board was given over to celebrating the extensive achievements of the WI drama group. Each display board was brought to life with photographs of members, including many from the 1920s and 30s.

As well as the exhibition, visitors could partake of refreshment in our own recreation of a Lyons Corner House Tea Room. Committee member, Pat Stansfield made hats, cuffs and aprons to the pattern of those worn by the 'Nippy' Lyon's waitresses (so called because of their speed of service). Suitably attired members delighted visitors with waitress service and the cake trolley. Many comments were made comparing our 'café' to a famous teahouse in nearby Harrogate!

Over the course of the weekend approximately 150 visitors attended the exhibition, with people coming from neighbouring WI's, towns and villages. Particular thanks must go to Killinghall WI who turned out in large numbers. Feedback on the event was amazing, with visitors posting on Facebook urging others to attend. A selection of comments include: 'Lovely exhibition..' 'Fabulous memories', 'Beautifully put together exhibition and wonderful waitresses'.





Further celebratory events are planned during the year including a short holiday to Norfolk. We hope to continue to enjoy *Friendship*, *Fun and Laughter* for another 100 years.

When I read in the WI learning hub that Beamish was celebrating International Women's Day, I just had to go and what a day it was. I was lucky to go with Helen Smith and Susan Moss from Bishop Monkton WI. This was the brief on the ticket:

The NFWI International Women's Day Exhibition will be held in the 1950s welfare hall. Furthermore, Suffragette rallies will be held at 11am and 2pm in The 1900s Town to mark International Women's Day.

So of course we had to play the part. When we arrived, there were buses to take us to the different towns. We had enough time to look around the 1950's town before the rally. Then into the Masonic Hall where the action started! They were auctioning a lady's jewellery to pay her taxes! There were boos and jeers from the crowd which had gathered in the hall, but we were careful not to get arrested because we wanted to march. The crowd then moved outside, the ladies lined up and the march began. The shopkeepers tried to heckle and shame us back into our homes, but our "VOTES FOR WOMEN!" drowned them out. They were no match for the Ladies of the WI. We marched to the park where The Beamish WI ladies congregated on the bandstand and entertained us with suffragette songs.

We had an additional insight whilst in the dentist's room in the 1900's town. Helen, a retired dentist, was allowed into the exhibit to explain the instruments to us. Susan was even allowed to carefully sit in the now fragile dentist's chair whilst Helen performed "an old style extraction". She stated that "not much had changed in the instruments used between then and now". It was a lovely atmosphere. We had a small sense of what it would have been like and everyone joined in. We continued then to look around the other towns and the exhibition, finishing with fish and chips! A lot of people who were visiting Beamish that day, hadn't known about the WI participation, but they enjoyed the extra entertainment and so many people were reminiscing in the homes about their childhood or days with gran in her home.

Thank you Beamish for putting on a day for The International Women's Day. I hope we get to do it again.
